City Issues

- Advocate that Boca Raton equitably structure the Fire Service Fee and seek cost reductions for fire protection services.
- Support investing the city revenue generated by the one cent sales-tax in areas of economic development and necessary public infrastructure needs in Boca Raton.
- Support the BID (Business Improvement District) Steering Committee and its activities
 to provide a funding mechanism to enhance and improve the Downtown infrastructure,
 parking, and transportation, to include the construction of a parking garage, and the
 establishment of a Downtown and FAU circulator.
- Create an ordinance that allows a local preference positive adjustment in the bid process when the company holds a Business Tax Receipt issued by the City of Boca Raton.
- Implement streamlining measures to Boca Raton's building permit issuance procedures and Individual Development Approvals. Fully implement the pattern book/IDG in 2018.
 Fully implement all Planned-Mobility ("PM") districts in the City.
- Support coordinated efforts of the Palm Beach County School Board, Boca Raton City Council and residents to alleviate transportation and traffic issues during school rebuild/ construction (Addison Mizner and Verde Elementary).
- Support Florida Atlantic University's efforts to work in collaboration with the City of Boca
 Raton on the reinvention of the 20th St. district and the development of an ongoing
 comprehensive "Town and Gown" relationship. In addition, the Chamber supports the

County Issues

- Support Florida Atlantic University and the Research Park at FAU's leveraging of its resources and strategic partnerships to enhance and/or develop programs that foster entrepreneurship and expand the region's high tech workforce.

State Issues

- Continue to support the elimination of the statewide sales tax on commercial leases, using a multi-year step-down to ease the budget impact, starting with immediately eliminating the tax on the property tax portion of rent considered to be double taxation.
- Support appropriate workers' compensation reforms related to the 2016 Florida Supreme Court ruling eliminating attorney fee caps.
- Support the funding and mission of Enterprise Florida and Visit Florida to coordinate
 the economic development interests of the various counties, to market Florida as the
 ideal business and tourism destination, and to represent Florida's business community
 overseas
- Oppose adopting new legal guidelines for personal injury that allows prejudgment interest to begin accruing on the date of injury.
- Support passage of statewide guidelines to allow employers the opportunity to continue to have the right to maintain and enforce a drug free workplace as it relates to the legalization of medical marijuana.
- Oppose workplace initiatives which seek to inhibit employer rights by expanding employee rights in vague and unenforceable ways that interfere with employer-employee relationships.
- Support funding for Florida Atlantic University. Specifically, support FAU's efforts to expand it graduate and undergraduate research portfolio, increase entrepreneurship through its Tech Runway program, and replace the aging A.D. Henderson University Lab School facility
- Oppose legislation that holds private businesses liable for barring concealed-weapons license holders from carrying guns on their property
- Provide additional funding, resources and research to fight opioid crisis
- Enhance State funding to enable school districts to grow student participation in career academy and adult education programs by at least 10%.
- Increase the cap on available credits to companies performing Research and Development in Florida.
- Support the allocation of additional construction funding (Public Education Capital Outlay, PECO) for new buildings on Palm Beach State College's campuses.
- Support efforts to increase opportunities for Palm Beach State College and the School District to collaborate on programs to ensure that students are college and work ready.
